Where are you now (location/career/using your French, etc)?

I am studying Psychology and French at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby and will be entering my third year in the fall of 2025. This summer I am away in Paris to expand upon my French language skills as well as explore the incredible city. I am really falling in love with Paris and having background with French in school helps a lot to get around and meet new people, and I am planning to return one day.

A favourite memory from French Immersion:

I loved the cultural integration in Colletpville during the week of Carnaval (the Québécois celebration) in February. In my first year in Colletpville, this was the first time I was ever able to experience and participate in a different culture and it meant the world to me. My favourite events in Carnaval were making and racing tacot cars, rolling sticks of maple syrup in the snow, and meeting Bonhomme.

What are you most proud of from your French Immersion experience?

French Immersion really can be a challenge, but what I am most proud of is sticking with it. In doing so, I developed a deep gratitude for French as a second language and decided to pursue it in university, a decision I may not have made had I not explored the domain to the extent I have from elementary school to high school.

How did French Immersion help you?

Though I had many difficulties with acquiring French, I noticed that I kept improving every year and learned a valuable lesson that the sun shines brighter on the other side of every challenge and by persisting through, I saw everything around me become brighter as I did not give up. An example is that I found a love for writing and French music in my later years of high school.

A few accomplishments I have achieved:

- This year at SFU, I won third prize in a French Writing competition, which had a monetary benefit, and my writing will be published sometime this summer.
- My French played a large role in obtaining an Entrance Scholarship to cover my tuition fees for my undergrad degree.
- Bilingualism is impressive on the resumé and contributed to my success in various job applications and scholarship applications.
- I consider travelling solo to Paris an accomplishment, as I really had to dig deep within myself to come up with the bravery to do so. Knowing French, I have more confidence navigating the city and I have been meeting so many amazing people from all over the world.

What would be your advice to current French immersion students?

For most students, the beginning of French Immersion will be much more challenging than to begin in an English-speaking school. Some students acquire the language quickly, but for myself and many others, this is not the case and can even take until the later years high school to develop confidence with the language. Patience is a crucial quality here that eventually opens the horizon for incredible prospects that greet you with open arms. I have never heard anyone from French Immersion ever regretting to try to conquer the hurdle. However, I have heard many say they wish they had done French Immersion, for the common reason being that they felt like they missed out on something truly special. I believe French Immersion is unfortunately an underrated education opportunity, despite it being saturated with an incredible future-oriented advantage.
